A look at the history of music down the ages, with an emphasis on music from Merseyside.

LIVERPOOL DURING THE ENGLISH CIVIL WAR

We often just mention the Civil War in Liverpool without stopping to think about what life would have been like for the people living in a war zone. During these three weeks we will stop for a while to look at Liverpool under the Roundheads and Cavaliers.

CRIMES AND MURDERS IN LIVERPOOL

A brief look at the more famous crimes in Liverpool and Scouse criminals.







Timetable 12TH JAN—THE BACKGROUND TO THE CIVIL WAR

Why was there a Civil War in England and did Liverpool care?

19TH JAN—ANCIENT MUSIC

We look at how basic music developed wherever civilisation emerged and what prompted it. We listen to how it sounded.

26TH JAN—LIVERPOOL UNDER PARLIAMENT

Parliamentary forces took over in Liverpool in about April 1643. Later in that year "divers Papists" were among those expelled from the city. What was life like under these circumstances?

2ND FEB—EARLY MUSIC

A look at the timeline of musical development from Baroque to the classical great such as Beethoven, Bach, Handel and Vivaldi.

9TH FEB—THE SIEGE OF LIVERPOOL

In 1644 the civil war proper arrived in Liverpool with trenches dug throughout the city (including along what is now Lime Street) and the castle besieged and eventually damaged to such a point that it was demolished 50 years later. Again, what would it have been like for the ordinary people living in Liverpool

during the siege? 16TH FEB—MODERN MUSIC

The arrival of electricity, gramophones, records and wireless ushered in modern music punctuated by two World Wars leading to everything from Ragtime to Abba.

23RD FEB-MURDERS & CRIMES IN LIVERPOOL BEFORE VICTORIA

Highwaymen, Jacobites and the Ducking Stool—criminal justice in early Liverpool.

2ND MARCH—MUSIC OF THE MERSEY

Liverpool's glorious range of musical genres after the War included classical, blues, jazz, folk, Irish ceili and country music. With so many music halls, pubs and theatres across the City you could always find your favourite artists.

9TH MARCH—CRIME IN VICTORIAN LIVERPOOL

As Liverpool's population grew so did its criminal classes. In this session we will look at everything from Spring Heeled Jack to James Maybrick, a possible suspect for Jack the Ripper.

16TH MARCH—MERSEYBEAT

'Merseybeat' was the name of a music paper founded in Liverpool. There were about 500 groups on Mersyside from 1958-1965 lincluding, of course, the Beatles. **23RD MARCH—CANAL**

MEMORIES ON THE PRIDE OF SEFTON
